Your Official Information Act request, reference: HNZ3570 - hallucinogenic-induced psychosis

Thank you for your Official Information Act request received 30 August seeking information from Te Whatu Ora - Health New Zealand Waitematā about hallucinogenic-induced psychosis.

Before responding to your specific questions, it may be useful to provide some context about our services. Waitematā is the largest and one of the most rapidly growing health districts in the country, serving a population of around 650,000 across the North Shore, Waitakere and Rodney areas. We are the largest employer in the district, employing more than 8,900 people across more than 80 locations.

In addition to providing care to our own resident population, we are the Northern Region provider of forensic mental health services and child rehabilitation services, plus the metro Auckland provider of child community dental services and community alcohol and drug services.

In response to your request, we are able to provide the following information:

1. How many people were admitted to hospital due to hallucinogenic-induced psychosis within the Auckland region due to between the years of 2002 - 2022?

Thank you for your subsequent clarification that this was to include Emergency Department admissions. The information below is for the Waitematā district only.

As your request was specific to psychosis induced by hallucinogens, we have used the International Classification of Diseases (ICD) codes related to those presentations. Please note, there are subcategories for mental and behavioural disorders related to psychoactive substance abuse which have not been used.


No patients lost their lives within the Waitematā district as a consequence of an admission/event related to hallucinogenic-induced psychosis between 2002 to 2022.
