Re: Official Information Act request - antidepressants

Thank you for your Official Information Act request of 18 February seeking details from Waitemata District Health Board (DHB) as follows:

• all information totalling the number of patients prescribed antidepressants in 2018. Please include the age and gender of the patient(s)

Before responding to your specific questions, the following contextual information may assist your understanding of Waitemata DHB and the services we provide.

Population and services:

 Our DHB serves a resident population of more than 630,000 people – the largest DHB population in the country. In addition to caring for patients domiciled within our own district, Waitemata DHB is also the Northern Region provider of forensic psychiatry and the Auckland provider of community alcohol and drug services.

Completeness and accuracy of the data:

- The majority of people who receive antidepressants while admitted to hospital have existing community prescriptions for these which continue after discharge. We anticipate that data for inpatient use is a duplicated subset of the community data provided by Technical Advisory Services (TAS). The figures should not be added together.
- The data provided below has been gathered from our electronic prescribing system which is used by the majority of inpatient services including medical, surgical, rehabilitation and mental health wards. While it has not been possible to gather data from admissions using paper charts during the 2018 calendar year for this request, patient numbers and details should already be captured in community prescription data for the Waitemata catchment, as outlined above.
- Total figures may vary according to whether data was collected for those identified as domiciled in the Waitemata district, or for all individuals who have obtained their prescription supplies from within the Waitemata catchment, i.e. of the 358,655 prescriptions dispensed for Waitemata-domiciled patients in 2018, 34,565 were dispensed in other parts of the country.

Interpretation:

Use of medication classified as an antidepressant does not indicate a diagnosis of depression. Some antidepressants are first-line treatments for other conditions e.g. neuropathic pain (see https://bpac.org.nz/bpj/2016/may/pain.aspx). There were 14,559 outpatient prescriptions for nortriptyline and amitriptyline identified for patients domiciled in the Waitemata catchment that included details of the dose. 88% of these were at doses used for neuropathic pain rather than depression.

Responses to your specific questions are provided below. Please note this information relates to inpatients only and we understand the community information will be sent to you separately by TAS, which has contacted you separately in relation to this.
